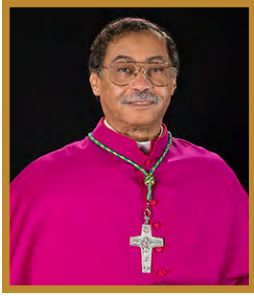

BISHOP ROY E. CAMPBELL, JR.

Session I - Welcome & Keynote Address

Bishop Roy E. Campbell, Jr., was born on November 19, 1947 to Roy Edward Campbell, Sr. and Julia Ann (Chesley) Campbell, and has been a life-long member of the Archdiocese of Washington. He was baptized at St. Mary Star of the Sea in Indian Head, MD, received his First Holy Communion in 1956 at Saint Cyprian Church in Southeast Washington and the Sacrament of Confirmation in 1959 at the Shrine of the Sacred Heart Church in Northwest Washington.

In January 2003, Campbell entered Pope St. John XXIII National Seminary to begin his priestly formation, and completed his seminary studies at in 2007, graduating with a Master of Divinity degree. He was ordained into the priesthood on May 26, 2007 by Cardinal Donald Wuerl. Bishop Campbell's first parish assignment was as parochial vicar at Saint Augustine parish in Washington 2007 to 2008, while also taking care of the sacramental needs of Immaculate Conception parish in Washington for six months. He was appointed pastor of Assumption Catholic Church in southeast Washington in 2008, and in 2010 was appointed to his current assignment, as pastor of Saint Joseph Catholic Church in Largo.

Bishop Campbell was ordained as an auxiliary bishop of Washington on April 21, 2017 by Cardinal Wuerl at the Cathedral of St. Matthew the Apostle. In addition to being the pastor of Saint Joseph's, he has served as dean of Middle Prince George's County, and is a member of the Clergy Personnel Board, Vocations Board and College of Consultants.



DR. ANDREW ABELA - Session II - General Session

Dr. Andrew Abela is the Founding Dean of the Tim & Steph Busch School of Business and Ordinary Professor of Marketing at The Catholic University of America, in Washington, D.C. From 2015-2019, he served as Provost of The Catholic University of America. His research on the integrity of the marketing process, including marketing ethics, Catholic Social Doctrine, and internal communication, has been published in several academic journals, including the Journal of Marketing, the Journal of the Academy of Marketing Science, the Journal of Business Ethics, and the Journal of Markets & Morality, and in two books. He is the co-editor of A Catechism for Business, from Catholic University Press, and winner of the 2009 Novak Award, a prize given by the Acton Institute for "significant contributions to the study of the relationship between religion and economic liberty."

Dr. Abela also provides consulting and training in internal communications to Fortune 100 corporations. Prior to his academic career, he spent several years in industry as brand manager at Procter & Gamble, management consultant with McKinsey & Company, and Managing Director of the Marketing Leadership Council of the Corporate Executive Board. He holds a B.Sc. from the University of Toronto, an MBA from the Institute for Management Development (IMD) in Switzerland, and a Ph.D. in Marketing and Ethics from the Darden Business School at the University of Virginia. Dr. Abela was born on the Island of Malta and is fluent in Maltese. He and his wife Kathleen live in Northern Virginia and have six children.



KATY TALENTO - Session III - General Session

Katy Talento is a health benefits consultant, a veteran health policy advisor, and an epidemiologist. She is Founder and CEO of AllBetter Health, an insurgent benefits advisory firm building lower-cost, higher-quality, kickback-free health plans for employers, including Catholic employers whose health offerings need to be consistent with the faith. Prior to starting AllBetter, Katy was the health policy lead in the White House on the Domestic Policy Council where her portfolio included health care reform, ending secret health care prices, lowering prescription drug prices, expanding health IT interoperability, combating the opioids and other drug addiction crisis, and promoting bioethics in the life sciences. Katy's portfolio also included defending the dignity of life, protecting conscience rights in health care, and preserving religious liberty. Katy has appeared on or been published in a number of media outlets, including CNN, EWTN, Sky News, Newsmax, The New York Times, The Candace Owens Show, The Hill, The Morning Consult, RealClear Politics, and others.

Prior to her White House appointment, Katy served five U.S. Senators over a 15-year period, including as top health advisor, legislative director and oversight investigator. She also worked in the private sector helping multinational energy companies protect their global workforce from infectious diseases, and served on the research faculty at Georgetown University Medical School.

Katy spent two years as a Catholic nun and has worked with the poorest of the poor from East Africa, to industrial Russia and inner-city America. Katy received a Master of Science degree in Infectious Disease Epidemiology from the Harvard School of Public Health and an undergraduate degree in Sociology from the University of Virginia. She lives in Leesburg, Virginia with her husband and two children.

JOHN P. CAHILL - Monday Session IV & V - A

John P. Cahill was appointed Chancellor of the archdiocese of New York by Cardinal Timothy Dolan in October of 2019. He is the first layperson to hold the position. As Chancellor, he oversees the temporal matters of the archdiocese on behalf of the Cardinal.

Prior to his service for the archdiocese, Mr. Cahill served as the senior counsel to the law firm of Norton Rose Fulbright, where he concentrated on energy and environmental issues and was recognized as one of the leading utility lawyers in the country. He was also the co-founder of the Pataki-Cahill Group, a strategic consulting firm focusing on the economic and policy implications of domestic energy needs.

Mr. Cahill has had a distinguished career in the public sector. He was appointed secretary and chief of staff to Governor George E. Pataki (the highest appointed position in the state) on February 27, 2002. In May 2005, he was given the added responsibility of leading and coordinating the rebuilding of the World Trade Center site in lower Manhattan. He also served as senior policy advisor to Governor Pataki. He advised the governor on a full range of critical issues, including coordinating the state's response to the aftermath of the attacks of September 11, 2001.

Mr. Cahill first joined the Pataki administration as general counsel to the New York State Department of Environmental Conservation (DEC) in 1995. In 1997 he was appointed commissioner of the DEC, where he led the state agency responsible for enhancing and protecting the state's natural resources. During his tenure at DEC, New York State was recognized as the national leader in environmental protection. Under Mr. Cahill's leadership, the State conserved over 1 million acres of land, protected New York City's watershed and developed cutting edge policies in the fight against climate change. Prior to joining the DEC, he was a partner in the New York City law firm of Plunkett & Jaffe, P.C., where his practice focused on environmental and municipal issues.

Mr. Cahill has been recognized by numerous organizations for his public service. He was a recipient of the Ellis Island Medal of Honor, presented to United States citizens for their outstanding contributions to America. The Adirondack Council awarded him with the Conservationist of the Year Award for his conservation efforts in the Adirondack Park. The National Audubon Society presented him with its William B. Hoyt Environmental Excellence Award for his statewide conservation efforts. In 2006 Mr. Cahill was appointed to the Pontifical Order of St. Gregory the Great by Pope Benedict XVI for his service to the Catholic Church.

Cahill currently serves on the board of trustees for the 9/11 Memorial & Museum, Archbishop Stepinac High School-White Plains, and the Open Space Institute. He is a member of Webster Bank's board of directors.

Cahill received his Juris Doctor degree and a Master of Law in environmental law from Pace University Law School. He received his BA in economics from Fordham University.

He is an avid long-distance athlete, having completed numerous marathons and triathlons, including several Lake Placid Ironmans. John and his wife, Kim, have four children and reside in Yonkers, New York.

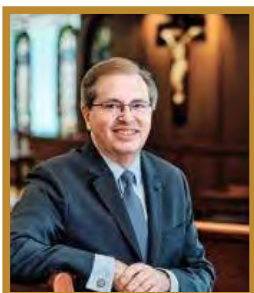


MADELINE OBLER - Monday Session IV & V - B

Madeline Obler, Esq. is Assistant General Counsel for the United States Conference of Catholic Bishops in Washington, D.C., where she provides legal advice to the Conference and to the staff of and attorneys representing thousands of 501(c)(3) and (c)(4) Catholic organizations nationwide on matters such as federal tax exemption; annual reporting requirements; political activity and lobbying; substantiation, disclosure, and reporting of charitable contributions; unrelated business income tax; entity choice, formation, and governance; grantmaking; income tax withholding, FICA, and SECA for U.S. citizen/resident alien and nonresident alien workers; Affordable Care Act compliance and reporting; retirement and welfare (including fringe) benefit plans; and other tax matters. Madeline is also responsible for maintaining the Conference's group exemption letter covering approximately 50,000 charitable organizations.

Prior to joining the Conference, Madeline was an Associate at Crowell & Moring LLP where she supported tax-exempt organizations at every step, from assisting clients in formation and application for tax exemption, advising on political and lobbying activities, and monitoring proposed legislation, regulations, and rulings that impacted her tax-exempt clients.

Thomas W. Carroll joined the Archdiocese of Boston Catholic Schools Office as Superintendent and Secretary of Education in 2019. He brings a mix of academic, public policy and development experience to the position having led a network of high-quality urban schools, renovating and constructing school facilities, advocating on behalf of Catholic schools, and raising millions in private donations for Catholic scholarships. Before joining Partnership Schools, Kathleen served as a nationally recognized reform leader, serving in leadership positions at the College Board, at Achievement First, in the Archdiocese of Washington, D.C., and at the Thomas B. Fordham Institute. She is also a Pahara-Aspen Education Fellow and has been an education fellow at Stanford University's Hoover Institution, and an adjunct fellow at the Manhattan Institute.

Kathleen has a lifelong commitment to Catholic education, having been educated from Kindergarten through college in Catholic schools and having begun her career in education teaching in Catholic schools in the Archdiocese of Washington, D.C. She is also a proud mom to three current Catholic school students.



KEITH PARSONS - Monday Session IV & V - C

Keith Parsons is the Chief Operating Officer of the Archdiocese of Denver and a member of the Board of Directors of the Diocesan Fiscal Management Conference (DFMC). He joined the staff of the Archdiocese at the beginning of 2015, initially as Chief Financial Officer. Prior to this, he led PwC's Technology and Emerging Company Services for the Rockies Market. A majority of his clients were private equity or venture capital funded. He has participated in several IPOs, secondary registrations and M&A transactions both as an advisor and in industry as a corporate controller for a global public company. Among his many responsibilities as COO in Denver is oversight of Catholic education. Outside of his day job, Keith enjoys spending time with his family and being physically active around his home in beautiful Colorado.



DAN CELLUCCI - Tuesday Session VI

Dan Cellucci is CEO of Catholic Leadership Institute, an apostolate providing leadership training and consulting to more than 290 bishops, 2,700 priests, and over 33,000 deacons, religious and lay leaders in more than 100 dioceses.

Prior to his election as CEO, Dan served as Senior Vice President for Catholic Leadership Institute, working as the primary liaison with bishops and overseeing the apostolate's marketing and services. Dan is a sought-after advisor, consultant, and presenter for the Church, playing a lead role in projects in the Archdioceses of Miami and Boston as well as the Diocese of Pittsburgh and at the North American College. Dan was recently nominated to serve as a member of the National Advisory Council for the United States Conference of Catholic Bishops.

Dan oversees research associated with Catholic Leadership Institute's Disciple Maker Index, a parish survey tool that seeks to help pastors and pastoral leaders focus their efforts toward evangelization. Since its inception, the Disciple Maker Index has reached over 2,100 parishes and 500,000 Catholics. Working with this incredible data and more than 25 years of field experience, Dan and the team have recently embarked on an ambitious plan to define what the Next Generation Parish and Diocese looks like in the next 10 years. She is a retired licensed Marriage and Family Therapist with experience in private practice and as a school counselor. Ms. Healy has a BS in Psychology and an MS in Counseling, M.F.C.C. option, with a Pupil Personnel Services Credential with Advanced Specializations in School Counseling and Child Welfare and Attendance Services, both from California State University at Los Angeles. 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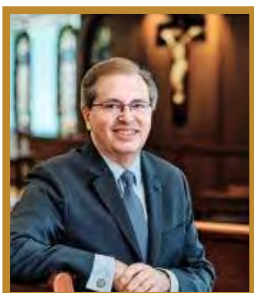

JOHN M. AIROLA - Wednesday Session X & XI - C

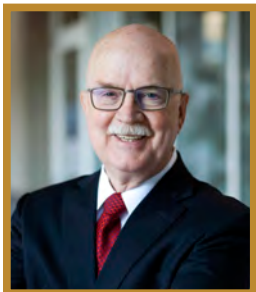

In short, every diocese has its own unique benefits footprint that requires consideration of both the practical challenges and complex tools that may be available.



MOTHER OLGA OF THE SACRED HEART

Session XIII - Member Business Lunch

Mother Olga of the Sacred Heart is the founder and mother servant of Daughters of Mary of Nazareth. She lived through four wars in Middle East. In 1993, as a young lay woman, she started a lay movement called Love Your Neighbor. She invited young men and women from Christian and Muslim communities to be part of this community to serve the needs of the poor in a war-torn area. In 1995 she established the order of Marth Mariam Sisters-Missionaries of the Virgin Mary, the first order for Religious Sisters in the Assyrian Church of the East in 700 years.

In her homeland Mother Olga was involved in pastoral ministry for the college students and youth in the parishes. She also served the prisoners, homeless, elderly, and handicapped of war for many years. The Minister of Public Health gave her the Humanitarian Award for her service to the poorest of the poor there.

She has a BS in Biology and Hematology and a MA in Philosophy and Theology from Babylon college that is affiliated with the Pontifical Urbaniana University in Rome. She also has a certificate in Theology of The Body.

She came to the United States in 2001 for her studies where she received her master degree in Pastoral Ministry from Boston College. From 2002- July 2011 she was involved in the campus ministry of the Catholic Center at Boston University. From July 2010- July 2011 she was named the University Chaplain for the Roman Catholic community at Boston University.

She was received into the Roman Catholic Church on September 8th 2005, in the Archdiocese of Boston. Cardinal Séan Patrick O'Malley, OFM. Cap. received her perpetual vows on December 8th 2005.

In April 2008, she received the award of the Religious Sister of the Year at the 2008 Boston Catholic Women's Conference. In April 2010, she received 'Saint Paul the Apostle Award' from the office of the New Evangelization of Youth and Young Adults of the Archdiocese of Boston. In May 19, 2011, she received an honorary Scarlet Key Award from Boston University. In February 2012, she received the Bowie Kuhn Special Award for Evangelization at the Legatus 2012 Annual Summit. On November 29, 2015, Cardinal Séan presented her with the Cheverus Award at the Cathedral of the Holy Cross. In May 2018, she received the Assyrian American National Federation Humanitarian Award and on October 2018 she received the Saint Edmund's Medal of Honor. In May 2022, she will receive an Honorary Degree from Providence College.

In summer 2009, Cardinal O'Malley gave her the permission to start a new apostolate on the Boston University campus called the Nazareth House. It was a house of prayer and discernment for young women. In April, 2011, Cardinal Séan Patrick O'Malley, entrusted to her the mission of establishing a new Religious Community of Sisters in the Archdiocese of Boston, Daughters of Mary of Nazareth.



REV. JOHN P. BEAL - Wednesday Session XIII

Rev. John P. Beal is a presbyter of the Diocese of Erie, Pennsylvania. Since 1992, he has been a professor of canon law at the Catholic University of America in Washington, DC.
